





SECTION 1. Provides that no permanent Indian nouses shall be built on the beach from the Catholic Church to One Hundred and Fifty feet west of Tyer street.

Sec. 2 Requires the Marshal to notify Indians coming for purposes of trade, or otherwise, that hey must not erect their mat lodges or tents, nor build fires within the above mentioned limits. Any croon violating either of the above sections shall be fixed in any sum not exceeding twenty dollars.





